Just like your mom may have stayed in the maternity ward of a hospital when you were born, dairy farms have a special area for cows to have their babies. These areas are designed to keep mom and calf feeling calm.

To keep calves safe and healthy after birth, they stay in individual calf hutches until they're two months old. In the hutch, they can't get trampled by bigger cows, and there's a lower chance of catching an illness.

Keeping Cows Comfortable

They use curtains, fans, and misters in the barns to move the air and keep it cool or warm. If the temperature gets too cold for calves, some farmers give them coats and cow "earmuffs."
